Do I Have to Recycle? Yes!

State and local laws direct that everyone—businesses and residents—recycle. Recycling of the following is available at all drop-off sites and from all trash haulers:

- paper and cardboard
- glass bottles and jars
- plastics #1 - #7
- metal cans
- aluminum cans, foil, pie plates, etc.



All electronics (e.g. computers, tv's, games, telephones, etc.) are also mandatory recyclables. Please bring them to an approved facility. Do not place them in your curbside recycling. NWSWD offers free disposal of televisions, computers, and computer components. Small fees may apply for other electronics. Contact us for more details.

Recycling can lower your trash bill by cutting down what you send to the landfill, reuses resources that are just too precious to throw away, and **creates jobs, too!** 5-6 recycling jobs are created for every 1 job that would be created by landfilling recyclable material.

Food scraps, leaves, and yard waste can be recycled, too. Leaves and yard waste are already banned from the landfill and residential food scraps will be banned in 2020. Get in touch or look on the back of this newsletter for more information on how we can help.

A final point: reducing the amount of trash that you throw away reduces your trash bill and is good for the environment, too. Before you buy something, ask yourself: "Do I really need this?" If you *must* buy something, try to buy items with recyclable packaging. And go to nswd.org for more tips on waste reduction.

Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Options

1. Georgia Recycling Center:

We collect Household Hazardous Waste from District member community residents **by appointment only** at our Georgia Recycling Center **year-round** Monday-Friday. **Fees apply for many items.** Payment by cash or check only. Call **(802)524.5986** with questions or to schedule an appointment. Check nswd.org for more information.

Materials accepted at Georgia Recycling Center:

Batteries: all batteries including auto accepted (at no charge)

Mercury bulbs

Stewardship Paint Program: latex/oil paint, varnishes, stains, wood/concrete waterproofing liquids

Non-Stewardship paints/coatings: auto, marine, industrial coatings/paints, asphalt coatings, thinners, aerosols

HHW materials: kitchen, bathroom, auto, and marine products; pesticides; aerosols; used oil; antifreeze; taping compound; adhesives

Other materials: fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, oil filters, propane cylinders, light fixture ballasts, mercury containing devices, used vegetable oil

2. Chittenden Solid Waste District (CSWD) Environmental Depot

The CSWD Environmental Depot in South Burlington is available to non-Chittenden County residents. This drop-off location may be helpful to District residents who travel south to the Burlington area. The Environmental Depot is open Wednesday – Saturday for residential-only HHW materials. No business wastes accepted. Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) materials are free: CFLs, batteries, less than 10 mercury lamps, and most paints. Fees apply for other items. Please check with CSWD for more information. **(802)863.0480.** Payment by cash or check only.

Note: No businesses or large loads at HHW events; please call (802)524.5986 for an appointment at our Georgia facility. **Small loads only at events.** Large loads may be **rejected.** **Fees apply for many items.** Payment by cash or check only. All HHW collections are open to all residents of our member towns.

Vermont Leads the Way in Responsible Waste Management: Act 148—Universal Recycling

Act 148—the Universal Recycling Law—is Vermont’s law aimed at increasing the recycling of solid waste. The Vermont Legislature unanimously passed the Universal Recycling law in 2012, which banned disposal of household recyclables (metal, glass, plastics #1 & #2, and paper/cardboard) on **July 1, 2015** (it was already the law for District towns!). Leaves, yard debris, and clean wood were banned on **July 1, 2016** and food scraps will be by **July 1, 2020**. It also requires solid waste haulers and facilities to collect these same materials.

These are all materials that have better uses than just being thrown in the landfill. Vermonters are thriftier than that! Furthermore, *recycling creates Vermont jobs!* For instance, NWSWD sends all of the paper and cardboard that we collect to **WestRock** in Sheldon, where it is turned into new cardboard packaging. Most of the metal that we receive (including appliances) ends up at **All Metals Recycling** in Hardwick, then goes on to become a variety of new metal products. We collect electronics, too, and send them to **Good Point Recycling** in Middlebury where metals and other useful materials are recovered. As you can see, landfilling materials that have more use in them is just plain wasteful.

These same concepts apply to food scraps, leaves, yard waste, and clean wood. Wood is already used to generate electrical power at **McNeil Generating Station** in Burlington. Heard of “cow power” (generating electricity on farms with cow manure)? **Vermont Technical College** is generating **power** and **heat** in Randolph using *manure and food scraps!* **Green Mountain Power** has similar plans in the works in St. Albans. Large-scale composting is picking up, too. NWSWD sends 4-5 tons of food scraps a week to be composted at **Hudak Farm** in Swanton. Compost is great for soil and food growth. Further, there are many other projects like these already occurring or being planned in Vermont. (But it’s not all high-tech and large scale; composting food scraps is something everyone can do with a little space in their backyard.)

Act 148 supports these innovations. Any organization that generates 26 tons/year (1/2 ton/week) of food scraps should already be separating them from their trash. By **this July 1st, food scrap generators of 18 tons/year** (1/3 ton/week) need to be separating. Lesser generators, including residents, will have to be in compliance in 2020. Having this material available gives Vermont innovators and entrepreneurs something to work with (Vermont produces approximately **60,000 tons** of food scraps a year)—who knows what they’ll come up with next?
